#### TREASURER'S REPORT

I am happy to report that as of May 18, 2015 our

Adirondack Bank account has a balance of \$15,351.81. The First Source checking and savings accounts were closed, and remaining balance of \$567.50 was moved into the Adirondack Bank checking account. An audit was completed in May 2015 by the board appointed audit committee and account activity and balances from 2014 to current were reviewed and verified with zero discrepancies. Our net-net (revenue minus expenses) for 2014 was a negative \$5667.75. Below is a highlighted breakdown:

#### Expenses

2014 expenses totaled \$9,204.75. Larger expenses include \$3,700 Fish Stocking; \$720 for website (2013-2015); Newsletter for \$417.00; Ski school shirts for \$1605.00, and Ski Show donation for \$1,000. The remainder of expenses totaling \$1762.75 represent costs for other annual lake events, such as the Pancake breakfast, Island Picnic, Board Meetings, and Land picnic.

#### **Deposits**

2014 total deposits (include memberships, donations, merchandise) were \$3,534.00. Our largest source of income remains membership dues. We continue to have a significant amount of interest and donations for fish stocking with 2014 donations totaling \$295.00.

#### Memberships

We have received 10 pre-paid 2015 KLIA memberships. Our 2014 paid KLIA membership was down 48 members from 2013 and represents a total 2014 membership of 120. We thank all those members for the current and past donations.

## <u>NYS DEC – Required Permits</u>

As an annual reminder, DEC permits are required for any work that causes a disturbance to the bed or the bank of our waterways. A permit is also required for any excavation or fill that is below the mean high water level, such as rip rap or dredging. (Article 15). Permits are also required for any work within a wetland or within 100'. (Article 24). Permits may also be required by other agencies, such as NYS Canals or the US Army Corps of Engineers.

Even if you don't think you require a permit from DEC or other agencies – check check check.

Written determinations can be provided by sending a written request along with the location (tax parcel number), written description of project and photos of the project area. If DEC concurs that no permit is required, they will respond in writing and you will have a permanent record if the project is ever questioned down the road.

Oneida and Herkimer County projects are generally handled in the Utica Office.

#### **BOATER SAFETY COURSE**

The NYS Office of Parks, Recreation, and Historic Preservation reminds all boaters under 18 (born after May 1, 1996) must obtain an approved Boating Safety Certificate to operate a motorboat in New York State.

In an attempt to make New York waterways safer, Governor Andrew Cuomo signed a law requiring anyone born on or after May 1, 1996 who wants to operate a motorboat to obtain a Boating Safety Certificate by completing an approved eight-hour course. Courses may be completed and certificates obtained through the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, U.S. Power Squadron, or the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary. A list of approved courses is available on the State Parks website http://nysparks.com/recreation/boating/boating-safetyclass.aspx. The state has also approved two online courses this year that are offered through boaterexam.com and boat-ed.com. Regardless of age, all personal watercraft (PWC) operators still need a Boating Safety Certificate.

State Parks encourages everyone, regardless of age, to consider taking a boater education class to sharpen their nautical knowledge.

For New Yorkers who have earned a Boating Safety Certificate, keeping track of it is even easier thanks to New York's new Adventure License. New Yorkers who have taken an approved safe boating course and received a Boating Safety Certificate, with just a few easy steps, can have the certification reflected as an anchor icon on their NYS Driver License, Non-Driver ID or Learner Permit. The personalized Adventure License eliminates the need to carry a separate certificate. For more information on the other benefits of getting an Adventure License, visit licensecenter.ny.gov.

The KLIA will again sponsor a Boater Safety Course which will be held on June 27, 2015 at the Forestport Town Hall. This is an eight hour class that will be

presented by the Oneida County Sheriff's Office. Upon successful completion of the course attendees will receive NYS certificates of completion that is required for any over the age of 10 to operate any motor boat, and those of any age to operate any PWC.

There is no cost to attend and you must be at least 10 years old. The class starts at 8:30. Preregistration is desired but not mandatory. You may call the Sheriff's office at 765-2211 or go to www.nysparks.state.ny.us/recreation/boating/safety-courses.aspx to register for this class and for information on other courses being offered.

The KLIA will provide coffee, juice and donuts. You should bring your own lunch as the class will take most of the day.

#### FISH UPDATE & 2015 KLIA PICKEREL TOURNAMENT

On June 14, 2014, the KLIA purchased and stocked 1000 large mouth bass that were 6-8 inches in many areas of the lake at a cost of \$3.70 per fish.

This year, the KLIA will once again hold a summer long tournament. In an effort to increase participation and membership, the KLIA Board voted to open this year's tournament to ALL.

We encourage all members to enter, have some fun, and perhaps even win. It is interesting to note that in 2013, our inaugural season-long tournament drew 27 entries who submitted 146.61 pounds of fish. In 2014, entries dropped to only 12 entries who submitted 75.04 pounds of fish. In order to continue this great event, we would like to see an increase in participation. Remember, it only takes one big fish to win!

#### **TOURNAMENT RULES**

The tournament will be held between June 15<sup>th</sup> and August 31<sup>st,</sup> 2013.

Contestant will be required to pre-register at: "THE STATION COUNTRY STORE". The cost to enter is **\$5.00** for paid KLIA members. Non-members can enters at a cost of \$20, which will include an optional one-year KLIA membership. Applications will be available on site. Entry fee will cover the contestants immediate family.

Entry fees must be paid at the time of initial entry and will be verified before any prizes are awarded. Winners

will be notified by telephone and award mailed to the address provided since the KLIA Land Picnic will be held prior to the end of this year's tournament.

All fish entered must appear "fresh-caught", not previously frozen and only from Kayuta Lake. Weighted fish will disqualify contestant. (Please be fair and compete honestly).

Weights recorded by store personnel are **final** and entry times are limited to normal store hours. (6:00am-10:00pm, 11:00pm on weekends). Fish must be bagged before entering store. Plastic bags will be provided. Remember, be considerate, their **customers come first.** Disposal of all fish is the sole responsibility of the contestant. **(Please do so in a responsible manner)**.

Three prizes will be awarded, all \$100.00 gift cards from **Bass Pro Shops** along with a **winner's plaque**.

**Prize #1** for heaviest single pickerel entered during the event .

**Prize #2** for heaviest (total) of combined pickerel caught and entered in one day.

**Prize #3** for heaviest (total) of combined pickerel caught and entered during the entire event. (Total weight will be tallied after August  $31^{st}$ ).

Please remember that all fishermen must abide by the laws set for the area which include size and catch limits even for pickerel.

## TRASH DAYS

The Town of Remsen is excited to offer a newly developed Town of Remsen Recycling Program to its residents in 2015. The opportunity to participate in the Recycling Program will be made available to all property owners in the Town of Remsen and will operate on the grounds of the Town of Trenton Recycling Center. The rules and procedures for the program are available at the Remsen Town Hall. Please contact the Remsen Town hall at 315 831-5558 with any question that you might have.

Under the Recycling Program, Remsen property owners are entitled to the privilege of visiting the Town of Trenton Recycling Center on a dedicated Town of Remsen Day each month. You are free to bring pick-up truckloads of items at your convenience during the hours of operation from 2 pm-8pm on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Monday of each month. You may visit the center as many times as you would like on Remsen days during the hours of operation. The only restriction is a limit of 4 car tires off the rims per property owner on each Remsen Day.

You must visit the Remsen Town Hall and provide proof of ownership of a parcel of land within the boundaries of the Town of Remsen (You must provide a current Town and County tax bill). You will then sign a registry in exchange for an official identification token.

The Town of Forestport dump days are June 13<sup>th,</sup> at Bear Creek Road and Sept 13<sup>th</sup> at the Town Barn on Route 12. Both days are from 8:30am to 2:00pm for Town property owners. Visit the website for more details: www.townofforestport.org.

The Town of Remsen will once again be holding a free trash day for all property owners in the township. The trash day will be held at the Highway Garage located on Phelps/Buck Rd. in Remsen on Saturday, September 13<sup>th</sup> from 7:00am until 3:00pm. If you own property in the Town of Remsen you are eligible to participate. Property owners will be allowed one permit per parcel and all participants will need a permit. Permits may be picked up at the Town Hall Monday through Friday 8:00am until 3:00pm, or at the Town Clerk's Office Mondays 5:00pm

until 7:00pm, Thursday 6:00pm until 8:00pm. You may bring one pickup truck load per permit.

## **AROUND THE COMMUNITY**

Kayuta Lake Campground has re-opened its boat launch to the public for the 2015 season on a trial basis. The 2015 Launch Fee is \$7.00 (tax included).

Launch Guidelines:

- Launch will be accessible May 15th to October 14th only.
- Launch is closed to the public on holiday weekends (Memorial Day, July 4th & Labor Day weekends).
- Launch will be open during office hours ONLY. Office hours are Sunday-Thursday 9am-4:30pm, Friday & Saturday 9am-7pm
- The 5mph Speed Limit on Campground Rd and inside the campground will be strictly enforced. Please drive slowly.
- Launch fee covers Boat Launch ONLY. Access to campground facilities (pool, beach, games, play-ground, entertainment, etc.) is restricted to our registered campers only.
- Launch pass is a single use pass. Good for 1 boat on 1 day. Multiple boats require multiple passes.
- You must stop at office to get your launch pass BE-FORE proceeding to the launch area.

Please, for the safety of the campers & the continued availability of the launch, we request that the above guidelines be followed by everyone wishing to use the launch.

#### KAYUTA LAKE CRITTERS

If you've gone looking for raptors on a clear day, your heart has probably leaped at the sight of a large, soaring bird in the distance– perhaps an eagle or osprey. But if it's soaring with its wings raised in a V and making wobbly circles, it's likely a Turkey Vulture. These birds ride thermals in the sky and use their keen sense of smell to find fresh carcasses. They are a consummate scavenger, cleaning up the countryside one bite of their sharply hooked bill at a time, and never mussing a feather on their bald heads. They are large dark birds with long, broad wings. Bigger than other raptors except eagles and condors, they have long "fingers" at their wingtips and long tails that extend past their toe tips in flight. When soaring, Turkey Vultures hold their wings slightly raised, making a 'V' when seen head-on.

Turkey Vultures appear black from a distance but up close are dark brown with a featherless red head and pale bill. While most of their body and forewing are dark, the undersides of the flight feathers (along the trailing edge and wingtips) are paler, giving a two-toned appearance. They are majestic but unsteady soarers. Their teetering flight with very few wingbeats is characteristic. Look for them gliding relatively low to the ground, sniffing for carrion, or else riding thermals up to higher vantage points. They may soar in small groups and roost in larger numbers. You may also see them on the ground in small groups, huddled around roadkill or dumpsters.

Turkey Vultures are common around open areas such as roadsides, suburbs, farm fields, countryside, and food sources such as landfills, trash heaps, and construction sites. On sunny days, look for them aloft as early as 9 a.m.; in colder weather and at night they roost on poles, towers, dead trees, and fence posts. It uses its sense of smell to locate carrion. The part of its brain responsible for processing smells is particularly large, compared to other birds. Its heightened ability to detect odors—it can detect just a few parts per trillion—allows it to find dead animals below a forest canopy.

The Turkey Vulture maintains stability and lift at low altitudes by holding its wings up in a slight dihedral (Vshape) and teetering from side to side while flying. It flies low to the ground to pick up the scent of dead animals.

Not everyone sees vultures as a creepy harbinger of death—many see them as sacred for their cleanup role. Tibetan Buddhists practice "sky burials," where animals, usually vultures, consume their dead. Similarly, Zoroastrians offer their dead to be consumed by vultures on a raised platform, called a *dakhma*. They regard vultures are precious animals that release the soul from the body. However, in parts of urban India, where vultures have become scarce because of accidental poisoning by a livestock anti-inflammatory drug, not enough vultures remain to meet the demand and some people have turned to burial.

The word vulture likely comes from the Latin *vellere*, which means to pluck or tear. Its scientific name, *Ca-thartes aura*, is far more pleasant. It means either "golden purifier" or "purifying breeze."

In cowboy movies the bad guy usually threatens to leave the hero in the desert for the buzzards, meaning the vultures. Although buzzard is a colloquial term for vulture in the U.S., the same word applies to several hawks in Europe. In fact, the Rough-legged Buzzard (*Buteo lagopus*) of Europe is the same species as the Roughlegged Hawk of North America.

Turkey Vultures eat carrion, which they find largely by their excellent sense of smell. Mostly they eat mammals but are not above snacking on reptiles, other birds, amphibians, fish, and even invertebrates. They prefer freshly dead animals, but often have to wait for their meal to soften in order to pierce the skin. They are deft foragers, targeting the softest bits first and are even known to leave aside the scent glands of dead skunks. Thankfully for them, vultures appear to have excellent immune systems, happily feasting on carcasses without contracting botulism, anthrax, cholera, or salmonella. Unlike their Black Vulture relatives, Turkey Vultures almost never attack living prey.

On the ground they move with ungainly hops and are less agile than Black Vultures. Often, especially in the morning, they can be seen standing erect, wings spread in the sun, presumably to warm up, cool off, or dry off. Outside of the breeding season, Turkey Vultures form roosts of dozens to a hundred individuals. When Turkey Vultures court, pairs perform a "follow flight" display where one bird leads the other through twisting, turning, and flapping flights for a minute or so, repeated over periods as long as 3 hours. Migrating flocks can number in the thousands. At carcasses, several Turkey Vultures may gather but typically only one feeds at a time, chasing the others off and making them wait their turn. Despite their size, Turkey Vultures are often driven off by smaller Black Vultures, Crested Caracaras, Zone-tailed Hawks, and other species.

Turkey Vultures have been increasing in number across North America since the 1966, according to the North American Breeding Bird Survey. Partners in Flight estimates a global breeding population of 18 million with 28 percent spending some part of the year in the U.S., 9 percent in Mexico, and 1 percent breeding in Canada. Turkey Vultures were threatened by side-effects of the pesticide DDT. Today they are among the most common large carnivorous birds in North America. However, because they live on rotting meat, like California Condors, they can fall victim to poisons or lead in dead animals. The main concern is lead shot that ends up in carcasses or gut piles left by hunters. The animals eat the shot and eventually suffer lead poisoning. Other threats include trapping and killing due to erroneous fears that they spread disease. Far from it, vultures actually reduce the spread of disease.

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
